

However, those remaining disciples who were faithful could reproduce much more and they focused and dedicated carrying out the gospel mission. Parental Authority on Character Building

The Bible says, "There is a time for everything, and a time for every activity under heavens," (Ecclesiastes 3:1). Training of children has limited span of time. They grow fast and go into transitioning a child to an opinionated teen, having a mind of their own and more assertive in nature, in just a few years. Training a young mind is less challenging than the older ones. Character building plan, therefore, must be intensely laid out in their developmental years. The younger we begin; the better outcome is promised. Mrs. White reminds us that training of children must be effective, and we must seek to "govern your children and mold their characters to meet the requirements of God," (AH, p. 164).

The proper use and employment of parental authority is crucial during years 2-3 and 4-5. With their total dependency upon caring and loving adults, their sense of control and moral senses could be developed. Ellen White says, "Too much importance cannot be placed on the early training of children. The lessons that the child learns during the first seven years of life have more to do with forming his character than all that it learns in future years."[i]

The key word for winter is authority. Tasks administered during this season should strengthen parental authority. Between 2 and 3, children can learn to make their bed, pick up toys and books, help feed pets, help wipe messes, put dirty clothes in the right place, and even put a sock on their hand and help with the dusting!

Speaking of socks, between 4 and 5 children can match and fold socks, put away their clothes, tidy their room, set and clear the table, take laundry to the washer, and even help empty and load the dishwasher, if there is one.

Paul says, "Children, obey your parents; this is the right thing to do because God has placed them in authority over you" (Eph. 6:1, TLB). When children grow up acclimatized to parental authority, willing obedience to all authority figures will follow. Ellen White comments, "Thus to a great degree may be prevented those later conflicts between will and authority that do so much to arouse in the minds of the youth alienation and bitterness toward parents and teachers, and too often resistance of all authority, human and divine." Richard Williams had a strict regime mapped out for two of his daughters. His plan was written before they were born–it was 78 pages long. If they followed his authority, Williams said they would be successful. Their names were Venus and Serena. [iii]

Jeremiah said, "Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, before you were born, I set you apart" (Jer. 1:5, NIV). God's plan is for parents to carry His authority to their children. He promises, "Start children off on the way they should go, and even when they are old, they will not turn from it" (Prov. 22:6, NIV). If we follow His authority, God says we will be successful.

Ellen G. White on Discipline

(Education, p. 34)

"One of the first lessons a child needs to learn is the lesson of obedience. Before he is old enough to reason, he may be taught to obey. By gentle, persistent effort, the habit should be established. Thus, to a great degree, may be prevented those later conflicts between will and authority that do so much to create alienation and bitterness toward parents and teachers, and too often resistance of all authority, human and divine.

The object of discipline is the training of the child for self-government. He should be taught self-reliance and self-control. Therefore, as soon as he is capable of understanding, his reason should be enlisted on the side of obedience.



Ellen G. White's Corner

Let all dealing with him be such as to show obedience to be just and reasonable. Help him to see that all things are under law, and that disobedience leads, in the end, to disaster and suffering. When God says "Thou shalt not," He in love warns us of the consequences of disobedience, in order to save us from harm and loss.

Help the child to see that parents and teachers are representatives of God, and that, as they act in harmony with Him, their laws in the home and the school are also His. As the child is to render obedience to parents and teachers, so they, in turn, are to render obedience to God."

Let the child and the youth be taught that every mistake, every fault, every difficulty, conquered, becomes a stepping-stone to better and higher things. It is through such experiences that all who have ever made life worth the living have achieved success.
